

The National Cohesive Wildland Fire Management Strategy is a national collaborative effort to bring a broad cross-section of stakeholders together to address wildland fire management challenges. The Strategy directs wildland fire planning activities and has three primary goals: restore and maintain landscapes, develop Fire-Adapted Communities, and improve wildfire response.



Shaded Fuel Break Protects Local Neighborhood from Potential Wildfires

The Los Reyes Canyons community in Helotes, Texas is in close proximity to the heavily wooded Government Canyon State Natural Area. When drought-like conditions are present, the community is at risk for wildfires. In an effort to protect lives and property, firefighters and volunteers installed a shaded fuel break during February 2016. This was created by removing much of the understory brush and pruning off tree limbs (ladder fuels) that could carry flames into the canopy of the tree from the ground. This sort of mitigation work changes the way a wildfire would burn through this area, keeping the fire on the ground, versus the canopy, where firefighters can access it and more safely extinguish it.
